



SERMON TEXT: JEREMIAH 17:5-8

5Thus says the LORD:"Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength, whose heart turns away from the LORD. 6He is like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see any good come. He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land. 7"Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. 8He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.

Each week of our **ROOTS** series, we invite you to join us in fasting from one thing that week. Fasting may be broadly defined as "the voluntary denial of a normal function for the sake of intense spiritual activity" (Richard Foster, Christian Theologian and Author). Fasting may be new to you. We only invite you to fast from food one meal this week, so please check with your doctor if you're concerned about skipping a meal. Fasting is like dieting and exercise. If you want to eat and someone is keeping you away from food, it feels unbearable. If you are voluntarily fasting, there is an initial hard period or exhaustion, as your body gets used to it. Eventually you feel a new burst of energy and a lack of craving. Resisting the urge to indulge is a powerful tool to intensify our prayer lives, strengthen our fight against temptation, and deepen our gratitude. Our ultimate goal in fasting is deeper selfawareness and gratitude for Jesus' work on our behalf. He kept the fast that humanity could not keep. The entire Biblical story is the story of humanity feasting on the world. But rather than abandon us. Jesus came to keep the fast Adam could not. Jesus saved us through His perfect obedience, sacrificial death and miraculous resurrection. Jesus eternally fasts from sin. so that we can eternally feast with Him! We remember this great news as we devote ourselves to fasting and prayer during our **ROOTS** series.

These weekly fasts make us aware of our dependence upon God. In John Piper's words: "There is an appetite for God. And it can be awakened. I invite you to turn from the dulling effects of food and the dangers of idolatry, and to say with some simple fast: 'This much, O God, I want you.' For when God is the supreme hunger of your heart, he will be supreme in everything. And when you are most satisfied in him, he will be most glorified in you."

Choose one meal to fast from this week. Commit to set aside a definite time in advance whether part of a day, an entire day, or a combination of days, to pray that God would help you crave Him over the comforts of the world. It is easy to subtly advertise personal devotions, but here we are alone with Jesus. Remember that your voluntary practice of fasting is for God's eyes only.



2. ESTABLISHING THE ROOTS COMMUNITY GROUPS

READ: JEREMIAH 17:5-8

He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land. ⁷"Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. ⁸He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.

DISCUSS

THE SOURCE OF BLESSING

⁵Thus says the LORD: "Cursed is the man who trusts in man..."

- 1. Why do we tend to trust man (i.e., self or others) as a "first response"? Go deeper than: "well, it's in our sinful nature." What is appealing about trusting man?
- 2. How do the analogies of the shrub and tree in Jeremiah 17 shed light on what we are putting our trust in?

THE SYMPTOMS OF THE CURSE EXHAUSTION, DISTRACTION, LONELINESS

3. Like "a shrub in the desert" (v. 6) it is exhausting and empty to put your trust in man. Why so? In what way have you seen this to be the case in your life?

- 4. As Pastor Blake pointed out, the text doesn't say in verse six "there is nothing good to see," but rather "he shall not see any good come." How might we be distracted from seeing the living water of God's grace in our lives? What things are particularly distracting in day-to-day life? What can we do individually, or how can we help others, to live less distracted lives?
- 5. The shrub in verse six is presumably alone "in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land." It seems counterintuitive that trusting in man would be lonely, but why would that be the case?

THE SEARCH FOR REST

The Bible challenges our default definition of trust and the object of our trust.

- 6. Faith, or trust, is to accept that something will happen in the future based upon what has been accomplished in the past (2 Peter 1:1-16). Biblical faith is not *blind* faith. How do you know if you *really* have faith/trust in something or someone?
- 7. The object of our faith is not "man" (i.e., ourselves or others) but Christ. How does having Christ as the object of our faith reverse the three symptoms of the curse as listed above?
- 8. Rest is conditioned upon trust. You can't really rest upon something unless you trust its strength and security. What does biblical rest look like in these areas:
 - A. Relationships?
 - B. Occupation?
 - C. Finances?
 - D. Children?
 - E. Recreation?

ROOTS GENEROSITY CHALLENGE

- 9. Does my spending define my generosity or does my generosity define my spending?
- 10. In what ways do I rest on what Christ has done for me in my generosity?

PRAY

Go to the Father to seek him as the source of all blessing. Ask Him to be diligent in our attentiveness to the symptoms of the curse in our lives. Entreat Him to prevent us from putting our trust in man, circumstance, wealth, or ability; that our trust would be in Him alone.

"LOVE REST IN GOD"

MY DEAR LORD

I depend wholly upon thee, wean me from all other dependances. Thou art my all, thou dost overrule all and delight in me. Thou art the foundation of goodness, how can I distrust thee? How can I be anxious about what happens to me? In the light of thy preciousness the world and all its enjoyments are infinitely poor: I value the favour of men no more than pebbles. Amid the blessings I receive from thee may I never lose the heart of a stranger. May I love thee, my Benefactor, in all my benefits, not forgetting that my greatest danger arises from my advantages. Produce in me self-despair that will make Jesus precious to me, delightful in all his offices, pleasurable in all his ways, and may I love his commands as well as his promises. Help me to discern between true and false love, the one consisting of supreme love to thee, the other not, the former uniting thy glory and man's happiness that they may become one common interest, the latter disjointing and separating them both, seeking the latter with neglect of the former. Teach me that genuine love is different in kind from that wrought by rational arguments or the motive of self-interest, that such love is a pleasing passion affording joy to the mind where it is. Grant me grace to distinguish between the genuine and the false, and to rest in thee who art all love.

INDIVIDUAL EXERCISE: Confidence in Self or Christ?

JEREMIAH 17:7-8

Cursed is the man who trusts in man... blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord.

How do we know if we're trusting in self or Christ? As Christians we are children of God, forgiven and dearly loved. Nothing can change that truth. But too often we live as though we are orphans, trying to find affirmation and our very worth from our good works, or finding satisfaction from someplace other than our Father. The list below will help you see to what extent that might be happening to you. The shrub in the desert is like the orphan. The tree is like the child of God.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN. CONSIDER...

It is true that as Christians, we might be able (at one time or another), to check most of the items on either side: "Tree/Children" or "Shrub/Orphan".

Therefore, to make this exercise more meaningful, place a number, 1 to 3, next to each item on both sides.

- 1 = This rarely describes me.
- 2 = This describes me occasionally.
- 3 = This is often true of me.

And since there is often more than one idea in each paragraph, underline words or phrases that most apply to you at this time in your life.

Do not spend a lot of time on evaluating each one. Go with your gut feeling.

FAMILY DISCUSSION

WEEK ONE: ROOTS FOR REST

October 21, 2018

MONDAY

READ: MATTHEW 11:28 Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest. » When we think about "rest," what do we usually think we are doing? » Why do we rest? » Would you try to rest on a broken chair or a rickety bed? » When we rest on Jesus, what does that mean? » Trusting Jesus is necessary to rest in Him? Why? » How can we show by our words and actions that we are resting in Jesus?

Children, ask your family to tell you a time they knew they were resting in Jesus.

TUESDAY

READ: JEREMIAH 17:5

Thus say the Lord: 'Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength whose heart turns away from the Lord.

Children, ask your family to explain what the word "cursed" means.

» In this verse in what does the cursed man put his trust? Is it God? Is it himself?

» When our hearts are turned away from the Lord, what does that mean? Where should our hearts be turned?

» What would someone be doing and saying, if their hearts were turned away from the Lord?

WEDNESDAY

READ: JEREMIAH 17:5-6

Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength whose heart turns away from the Lord. He is like a shrub in the desert and shall not see any good come. He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land.

» So the man who trusts in anything other than God has turned his heart away from the Lord. In verse six, what is this man like?

» What is a desert like? As a family, make a sketch of a desert. As you are sketching, discuss what it would be like to live there.

» How would living in a desert be like turning our hearts away from the Lord? What would our hearts be filled up with?

Children, ask your family to explain why it would be difficult to "rest" in a desert.

THURSDAY

READ: JEREMIAH 17:7

Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord.

» What does the word "blessed" mean?

» What does it mean when we say, we trust in the Lord?

» Trust has two main attributes: faith and confidence. Faith is trusting that something will happen in the future based upon something that happened in the past. Confidence is living in light of the reality of what we trust.

» How are the cursed man and the blessed man different?

Children, ask your family to tell you about how they came to trust in the Lord.

FRIDAY

READ: JEREMIAH 17:7-8

Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.

- » A healthy tree requires water and its roots move toward water, looking for what it needs to live. Why is the blessed man compared to a tree?
- » If a tree has deep roots, what happens when the wind blows? What happens to a tree with shallow roots when the wind blows?
- » What is a drought? Why is a drought difficult for vegetation? Is the tree described by Jeremiah worried about drought? What does this have to do with our trust in the Lord?
- » Make a sketch of a healthy tree by a stream with strong roots. Discuss what makes this a good comparison to the man who trusts in the Lord.

Children, ask your family to give examples of the good fruit we produce when we trust in the Lord.

SATURDAY

Prepare for Sunday worship.

READ: JEREMIAH 17:5-8

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Pray, thanking God for His beautiful picture of the healthy tree with strong roots, and ask Him to give you a clear understanding of what it means to trust in the Lord.

FAST CHALLENGE

SOCIAL MEDIA & VIDEO GAMES

Take a complete break from social media and video games this week. Rather than merely deny ourselves these things, let's see this as an opportunity to join together with our family and community to embrace something greater. Be intentional in how you replace your screen time. Create space to rest, play, and enjoy the Lord and others face-to-face.

Insight into this Spiritual Practice: Jesus did not abolish fasting as a practice but rather assumes it. How do we know this? Jesus said in Matthew 6:16-17, "And whenever you fast, ... But you, when you fast,..." Jesus expected his disciples to fast. Jesus himself fasted. The Spirit lead him into the wilderness, where he was tempted by Satan, where he fasted for 40 days. He didn't have too. In fact Jews were only commanded to fast one day a year, on the Day of Atonement (Lev 16). Yet here Jesus thinks it wise to fast in order to 1) fight temptation, 2) pray and 3) know himself better.

Father, please give us a humble spirit of fasting, that will enable us to fight daily temptations, to pray with greater understanding and depth, and to know ourselves better in order to serve You more fully.

DISCUSS THE DYNAMICS OF COVENANT COMMUNITY

- 1. Notice verse 27, "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it." We are members who work toward the health of the body, not the individual. How do our individual spiritual lives affect others in the covenant community?
- 2. In what way do we actually need (v. 21) one another?

THE FUNCTION OF COVENANT COMMUNITY

3. Pastor Blake said, "The church of Jesus Christ is not defined by how similar we are, but by how we work together for something bigger than each of us." What is the difference between a community built upon similarities and a community built upon purpose? 4. "Ultimate beauty comes not from a lover or a landscape or a home, but only through them" (Cornelius Plantinga, Author and Theologian). We, then, are called to be conduits, not cul-de-sacs, in God's covenant community. What might a covenant community of "conduits" look like? What might it look like in these four areas: means of grace, bearing one another's burdens, accountability, shaping the next generation?

THE UNIQUENESS OF COVENANT COMMUNITY

- 5. In what way is the covenant community different from other communities (e.g., families, neighbors, sports teams, non-profits, etc.)?
- 6. "The enticing invitation of the gospel is the scandalous belief that no problem, situation, or circumstance is beyond the redemptive work of God." As you reflect upon your time at Trinity, what have you seen that echoes this thought? What excites you about a covenant community that holds this truth dearly?

ROOTS GENEROSITY CHALLENGE

- 7. Who has had the most impact on my life in the area of generosity? (This could be a spouse, a teacher, a church leader, someone in your small group, a family member, a friend, a public figure.)
- 8. Do I believe that my generosity can influence others? How have I seen this happen, either for the positive or for the negative?

PRAY

Go to our Triune God to see that in Him all the fullness of community dwells. Ask Him to impart a heart of generosity and hope for our brothers and sisters. Invite Him to give you the very attitude that Christ had toward His church.

"FIRST DAY MORNING WORSHIP"

We commune with thee every day, but weekdays are worldly days, and secular concerns reduce heavenly impressions. WEEK TWO: ROOTS FOR COMMUNITY

October 28, 2018

READ: 1 CORINTHIANS 12:12-13

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body - Jews or Greeks, slaves or free - and all were made to drink of one Spirit.

- » Begin this week with an outline of the human body including a few major organs like the heart, lungs and stomach or use a picture from a science book. Discuss how the parts of the body work together. How would our hearts work without our lungs?
- » What does it mean that the church has many members? Name some of the members of the church. Discuss how people serve each other at church.
- » What does it mean that the church is one body?
- » The body is bound together. Our organs do not work outside our bodies and our legs and hands do not function apart from the rest of our body. How are people in the church bound together?

Children, ask your family to describe a way that someone in the church has served them.

MONDAY

READ: 1 CORINTHIANS 12:14-20

For the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot should say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,' that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear should say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,' that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there a many parts, yet one body.

- » What would happen if our entire body was an eyeball? What would happen if our entire body was an ear? We would be in a great deal of trouble!
- » What if suddenly your eye decided it was not part of the body and hopped away?
- » God arranged the parts of our body for different purposes, but they must work as a whole. How do we demonstrate in church, that we believe we are all sinners bound to God and to one another? What do we do during worship that reflects this belief?
- » Children of all ages are important parts of the church body. How does each child show they are part of the Trinity family?

TUESDAY

READ: 1 CORINTHIANS 12:21-26

The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you,' nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and treated with greater modesty, which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together.

» This section of scripture may seem difficult to understand. It is telling us that everyone in the church is important. Pastor Blake and Pastor Scott are not more important to Trinity than the youngest baby or the oldest man or woman. Each person is necessary, valued, and loved.

» What does this mean for you? Are you important to Trinity? Think of ways on Sunday we show that every person is important. Think about the nursery, morning discipleship classes (Sunday School), the various parts of worship, and what we do after worship.

Children, ask your family what they see their purpose in the church body might be.

Children, ask your family to tell about ways they have been made to feel that they are needed and important to the church body.

WEDNESDAY

READ: 1 CORINTHIANS 12:26

If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together.

» What does it mean to suffer?

» What does it mean to be honored?

» What would happen in church if everyone had the gift of playing the guitar? How would our worship service look?

» Why does Trinity need people who have different gifts?

Children, ask your family to tell about a time they suffered or rejoiced with someone from church.

Children, ask your family to share a time they can remember seeing one of their gifts being used in the church.

FRIDAY

And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating and various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? And I will show you a still more excellent way.

- » How can we help each other when people are discouraged, sad, sick or feeling lonely?
- » Why is serving and helping others our "job"?

Children, ask your family to tell you what being part of a church means to them.

WEEKLY FAST

RADIO & MUSIC

Fast from radio or music this week. Let's create space for intentional conversations, especially in the car (with your spouse, kids or friends). As we turn down some of the noise around us, we may be surprised how much more clearly we can hear and be heard.

DISCUSS

WHAT IS CALLING OR VOCATION?

- 1. God calls us into His Kingdom (upward calling) to lead a life (inward calling) in service to Him (outward calling). How do these three "callings" complement each other?
- 2. Occupation tells me how I am to provide for the material needs of my life and my family. But vocation tells me a deeper truth. It tells me how I am to provide for the Lord's Kingdom. Discuss how we might think of occupation and vocation as both separate and overlapping.

WHY DO WE NEED IT?

- 3. We live in a society that still maintains the significant Roman Catholic distinction between "sacred" work and "secular" work. Pastors and missionaries are seen as those with "calling," whereas engineers and janitors are seen as those with "occupations." Why might we tend to make such unbiblical distinctions?
- 4. The reformer Martin Luther once remarked: "The maid who sweeps her kitchen is doing the will of God just as much as the monk who prays—not because she may sing a Christian hymn as she sweeps, but because God loves clean floors." How does a remark such as this reverse our distinction between the sacred and the secular in terms of calling?

HOW DO WE FIND IT?

- 5. Theologian and poet, Frederick Buechner said, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." Yet most of us don't know exactly how to find this "place." Discuss your "place" (and encourage each other!) in the following:
 - a. Look outward: Affinity—what "people needs" do I resonate with?
 - b. Look inward: Ability—what are my abilities and deficiencies?
 - c. Look upward: Opportunity—where does the community tell me I am needed?

WHAT DOES CALLING GIVE US?

- 6. Discuss how understanding our calling frees us:
 - a. In our relationships.
 - b. In our mundane, daily choices.
 - c. In our finances.
 - d. In our time management.

ROOTS GENEROSITY CHALLENGE

- 7. Has my giving become comfortable and routine or does my giving allow God to change and grow me?
- 8. How might my calling be used to extend generosity?

PRAY

Go to the Father and ask Him to reveal more of your true calling, how you might be a kingdom-blessing to the world through all that you are and have.

INDIVIDUAL EXERCISE: WHAT IS MY VOCATION?

Read the following article and reflect upon the questions that follow. Put a "!" by something that excites you and "?" by something that perplexes you.

VOCATION: DISCERNING YOUR CALLING

Dr. Timothy Keller

As Christians we are stewards of the resources God gives us for serving the human community. Our vocations are one avenue for doing God's work in the world.

Stewardship is the cultivation of resources for God. The Bible tells us that one of the most important resources

God has given us is our gifts, aptitudes, talents, and abilities.

One of the sacraments of the medieval church was the Sacrament of Holy Orders, which divided the world into the "religious" and the "secular." Those who went into full-time church ministry as priests, monks, or nuns were on a completely different spiritual footing from those who did not. One of the Protestant Reformation's main planks was to overturn this view with the biblical teaching of the priesthood of all believers (1 Peter 2:9). Martin Luther insisted that *all* forms of work are God-honoring callings. To be a farmer, a craftsman, or an artist was just as much a vocation, a calling from God, as to be a preacher. Why?

ALL FORMS OF WORK ARE PARTICIPATION IN GOD'S WORK(1)

God made the created world by his Spirit (Gen. 1:1-3) and continues to care for and sustain it by his Spirit (Ps. 104:30), watering and enriching it (Ps. 65:9-13) and feeding and meeting the needs of every living thing (Pss. 145:15-16 and 147:15-20). Indeed, the very purpose of redemption is to massively and finally restore the material creation (Rev. 21-22). God loves this created world so much that he sent his Son to redeem it. This world is good in and of itself; it is not just a temporary theater for individual salvation.

If the Holy Spirit is not only a preacher that convicts people of sin and grace (John 16:8–11; 1 Thess. 1:5) but also a gardener, an artist, and an investor in creation who renews the material world, it *cannot* be more spiritual and God-honoring to be a preacher than to be a farmer, artist, or banker. To give just one example, evangelism is temporary work, while musicianship is permanent work. In the new heavens and new earth, preachers will be out of a job! Ultimately the purpose of evangelism is to bring about a world in which musicians will be able to do their work perfectly.

ALL FORMS OF WORK ARE WAYS OF SERVING OTHERS

Imagine how much time it would take to make a chair by yourself. You would not only have to cut and shape the

wood yourself, but you'd also have to make the tools. To make the tools, you'd have to mine the ore to make metal. It would take months, perhaps years, to do all the things necessary to create the chair. When you share in the work of others, however, you can buy a chair with money equivalent to some number of hours' worth of your time, not months or years of effort. Even if you want to make the chair yourself, you can buy tools made by someone else.

All work, according to God's design, is service. Through work we enrich one another and become more and more interwoven. When Christians do "secular" work, they function as salt and light in the world (Matt. 5:13-16). Farming and business, childcare and law, medicine and music—all these forms of work cultivate, care for, and sustain the created world that God made and loves. We are all ministers (priests) to the human community on God's behalf

Work is taking the raw material of creation and developing it for the sake of others. Musicians take the raw material of sound and bring the meaning of art into our lives. Farmers take the raw material of soil and seed and bring food into our lives. This means we are God's ministers in our work not only when we are witnessing or talking directly about Jesus, but when we are simply doing our work. A musician is serving God when she makes great music, not solely when she is singing about coming to Jesus.

ALL FORMS OF WORK ARE BASED ON GOD'S GIFTING

Isaiah 28:24–29 says, "When a farmer plows for planting" and "has leveled the surface... does he not plant wheat in its place, barley in its plot, and spelt in its field? His God instructs him and teaches him the right way... All this also comes from the LORD Almighty, wonderful in counsel and magnificent in wisdom." Isaiah is teaching that anyone who becomes a skillful farmer is being taught by God. In Isaiah 45:1 we read of Cyrus, a pagan king whom God anoints with his Spirit and chooses for world leadership. This is remarkable. It shows that God's Spirit can equip people for work—even though they are not believers and are not directly witnessing to him. God gives wisdom, courage, and insight to people to do their work well.

Indeed, James 1:17 says that "Every good and perfect gift is from above... from the Father of the heavenly lights." This means that every act of goodness, wisdom, justice, and beauty—no matter who does it—is being enabled by God. It is a "gift," and therefore some form of grace, even though it is non-saving grace. What this means is that God gives all people (not just Christians) talents and abilities that will equip them for serving the human community through particular forms of work.

The Bible speaks also of *spiritual* gifts (Eph. 4. Rom. 12. and 1 Cor. 12–14) that are abilities to minister to others in Jesus' name.(2) As people created in God's image, Christians have natural talents, and as people regenerated by the Holy Spirit, they also have spiritual gifts that equip them for ministry in and through the church. It is not always easy or necessary to make distinctions between natural talents and spiritual gifts, since ultimately they are all from the Spirit of God. For example, in Exodus 31:1-4, we read how Bezalel was filled "with the Spirit of God." with skill, ability and knowledge in all kinds of crafts—to make artistic designs." There is nothing in the spiritual gift lists of the New Testament about artistic gifts; yet, here we see that artistic skill comes from God (James 1:17 savs it would have to come from God). In the play and the movie Amadeus, the character Salieri describes Mozart's sublime music as "the voice of God." He was right.

KNOWING YOUR WORK

How does this work out for Christian believers? First, a Christian has to consider both of these questions: What has God called and equipped me for as my work/career? And how is God calling me to serve in and through the church?

In some rare cases, a person's church ministry becomes one's full-time career as well. Then the answers to the two questions coincide. In most cases, however, Christians must answer each question separately. Sometimes what you do in your "secular" calling is very similar to what you do inside the church. You may be a teacher or strategic planner or artist outside the church and use those same abilities inside. In other cases, you may find God calling you to do an almost completely different sort of work in

the church than you do out in the world. The banker might be a wonderful Sunday school teacher for children.

Nevertheless, I always propose a three-part method for discerning a call, whether to secular work or church work or anything else. To discern a ministry call, consult three factors: Affinity, Ability, and Opportunity.⁽³⁾

1. AFFINITY: WHAT "PEOPLE NEEDS" DO I RESONATE WITH?

Contrary to what many books on spiritual gifts say, do not start with yourself. Don't start with an abstract inventory of your gifts and skills to discern your aptitudes. Aptitude tests are based on past experience and self-knowledge, and your self-knowledge is limited. Even though it is one of the ways God shows you your ministry, I don't suggest starting there.

Rather, look at concrete needs in the community (context) around vou. What needs do vou "vibrate" to? What problems or kinds of people or ministry needs move you? Where do you discover an affinity? Paul experienced inner grief and turmoil as he saw the idols of Athens (Acts 17:16), so that led him to begin a ministry of apologetics (Acts 17:17). It is important that we get into ministry with a passion for a certain cause or unmet need. One of the reasons not to start with a knowledge of your abilities is because gifts often "pop out" and surprise us as we participate in a great variety of ministries. For example, before I came to New York City I would never have said that I had the gift of evangelism, but I now know that this was largely because it had been years since I had been in a setting where there were a lot of non-Christians. My "teaching" gift turns out to have a strong "evangelism" component that I would never have discovered unless New York City had brought it out. I had a burden for New York, and that led me to a deeper understanding of my own heart. I did not say, "I have a gift of evangelism. Where should I use it? I know—New York City!" Of course. the longer you are a Christian, the more likely you are to know vourself well and not to have such surprises, so a very mature Christian can begin this schema of "three factors" with any one of them. For most Christians. however, it is best to start with the needs of real people.

2. ABILITY: WHAT ARE MY ABILITIES AND DEFICIENCIES?

It is important to look at your abilities. Many people become burdened to see a ministry begin, but they are not realistic about their own abilities and limitations. For example, they themselves want to be leaders even though they do not have the gift of organizing and galvanizing people to follow them.

You must be very aware of the part you are able to play in a ministry. What should you be doing, and what do you need someone else to be doing? Also, have the maturity to recognize how young or old you are in the faith. You may realize that your godliness does not cover your gift deficiencies very well, and you therefore need a strong team around you.

It is important to understand that every kind of ministry needs "prophetic," "priestly," and "kingly" gift-mixes. (4)
This is one of the many reasons why we don't look to our abilities first. For example, it might be thought that if you have a priestly gift, you should be a deacon, but if everyone on the diaconate had only priestly gifts, it would be a disaster! You need vision casters and leaders and so on in every ministry. That is why we don't say, "All prophets should go into teaching ministries, all priests to mercy and justice ministries, and all kings to administrative duties."

3. OPPORTUNITY: WHERE DOES THE COMMUNITY TELL ME I AM NEEDED?

Finally, we must refuse to be individualistic in the way we discern our ministry. The doctrine of sin alone should be enough to prove that you should not be trying to make this decision yourself. Additionally, the Bible teaches that when we become Christians, we become "members of one another" (Eph. 4:25 NRSV). We cannot understand ourselves without paying attention to what our brothers and sisters can see. There may be opportunities for us to serve that we have never considered, but for which we are perfect.

Also, we are under the authority of our leaders (Heb. 13:7, 17), and we should bow to what they may tell us are the

church's needs. God put us into a community, and we discern his will and calling together.

SUMMARY

Your vocation is a part of God's work in the world, and God gives you resources for serving the human community. These factors can help you identify your calling.

AFFINITY—"LOOK OUT."

Affinity is the normal, existential/priestley way to discern call. What people needs do I vibrate to?

ABILITY—"LOOK IN."

Ability is the normal, rational/prophetic way to discern call. What am I good at doing?

OPPORTUNITY—"LOOK UP."

Opportunity is the normal, organizational/kingly way to discern call. What do the leaders/my friends believe is the most strategic kingdom need?

Your life is not a series of random events. Your family background, education, and life experiences—even the most painful ones—all equip you to do some work that no one else can do. "We are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Eph. 2:10).

WEEK THREE: ROOTS FOR TRANSFORMATION

November 4, 2018

SUNDAY

READ: MATTHEW 24:42B

Therefore, stay awake, for you do not know what day your Lord is coming.

- » Jesus' parable in Matthew 24 is about time. What is a parable? A parable is a simple story used to give a picture of a moral or spiritual lesson told by Jesus in the Gospels.
- » What do we know about time? How is time measured? Look around your house for the different ways time is measured. How many can you find? Remember calendars, planners, an hourglass, and timers all measure time.
- » Jesus tells us to stay awake because we do not know when (the time) the Lord is coming. Does this mean we should not sleep? How do we "stay awake" to be ready for the coming of the Lord?
- » During earlier discussions we talked about resting in Jesus. Now we are told to stay awake. How can we do both?

Children, ask your family to tell why time is important to notice. Ask why Jesus used time in the parable.

MONDAY

READ: MATTHEW 24:42-44

Therefore, stay awake, for you do not know on what day your Lord in coming. But know this that if the master of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.

» We do not know the time of the Lord's return, only that He will return. When He returns what would we want Him to find us doing or saying or thinking?

» Jesus is the thief in this parable. Do we know when a thief is coming? If we did know what would we do?

» Since we do not know the time that Jesus is returning, what does that mean we should do with our time?

Children, ask your family what they want to be doing when Jesus comes back.

TUESDAY

READ: MATTHEW 24:45-47

Who then is the faithful and wise servant, whom his master has set over his household, to give them their food at the proper time? Blessed is that servant whom his will so doing when he comes. Truly, I say to you, he will set him over all his possessions.

» The parable continues using the role of a servant and a master. A master would be the person who gave the servant his jobs or tasks. What job was the servant given?

» When the master finds the servant completing his work, how does the master react?

» What has God given us to do? He has a purpose for each of us.

» How do we approach what he has given us to do with a desire to honor God?

Children, ask your family how they make sure they are serving God.

WEDNESDAY

READ: MATTHEW 24:48-51

But if that wicked servant says to himself, 'My master is delayed,' and begins to beat his fellow servants and eats and drinks with drunkards, the master of that servant will come on a day when he does not expect him and at an hour he does not know and will cut him in pieces, and put him with the hypocrites. In that place there will weeping and gnashing of teeth.

» This servant decides to use his time for himself (he eats and drinks) and to put himself above the other servants (beats them). How is the master's response different from the master of the obedient servant?

» How do we use time for ourselves? What activities do we get involved in that take up time that could be spent in better ways?

» If we are trying to serve God and others, what activities might we have to let go of?

THURSDAY

Pastor Blake has been teaching us that God calls us into His kingdom to lead a life of service to Him. How can we know what we are called to do?

» Look out. Look around you. What do people around you need? Consider the needs of your family, your friends, and the church.

» Look in. Look at what you are able to do. What can you do with what you have and with the things you know?

» Look up Rely on others to help you decide where you can serve. We are members of Christ's church and needs arise that we may not know about. We may have the talents and attributes to meet those needs. How can we know the needs of others? Who in the church can help us reach out to others?

Children, ask your family how knowing we are to lead a life of service changes the way we think about church. Consider, is church about Sunday service? Is church about our friends?

Children, ask your family how they spent today. Would they do something differently after considering this parable?

FRIDAY

READ: MATTHEW 22:37-39

You shall love the Lord your God with all our heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it:

You shall love your neighbor as yourself.

» How do we learn to love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength?

» When you tell someone you love them, what does that mean?

» When we are called to love our neighbors as ourselves, what must happen to our individual and personal desires and wants?

Children, ask your family to give an example of how we love God with our mind.

SATURDAY

Prepare for Sunday worship.

READ: MATTHEW 22:37-39

And he said to him, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself.'

Pray that God will work in our hearts so that when Jesus returns, we are found to be good and faithful servants. Pray that as we buy the land to build a place for Trinity, we would never forget God's mercy and grace toward us. Pray we would love our neighbors.

Daniel B. Wallace, Greek Grammar Beyond the Basics (Grand Rapids: Zondervan, 1996), 642-645). How would the meaning of the text change if the text were to read "As you go..."?

- 5. What does covenant renewal look like when done in the Church and through the Church?

- » What is a disciple? It refers to someone who takes up the ways of someone else. So, to make disciples for Jesus, we must first be a disciple of Jesus.
- » Are you a disciple? How do you know?

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. And when they saw him they worshiped him, but some doubted. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

» Part of the commission (task, command) Jesus has given us, is teaching about what Jesus has commanded us to do. How do we know what Jesus commanded us to do?

» Are we left on our own to work up lots of strength and energy to follow the commands of Jesus?

» Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to live in us and Jesus sits at the right hand of God praying for us. How does this help us to follow His commands?

Children, ask your family about ways in which they sin. What is the good news about our sin?

Children, talk to your family about what it means to them to have Jesus with them always.

SATURDAY

Prepare for Sunday worship.

READ: MATTHEW 28:16-20

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. And when they saw him they worshiped him, but some doubted. And Jesus came and said them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

Pray, thanking God for his wonderful work of salvation. Ask Him to work in the hearts of our children, and to use us to disciple them and the people God puts in our path. Pray that God will give us roots, in the form of a church building, to better share the work of Christ and to make disciples.

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
